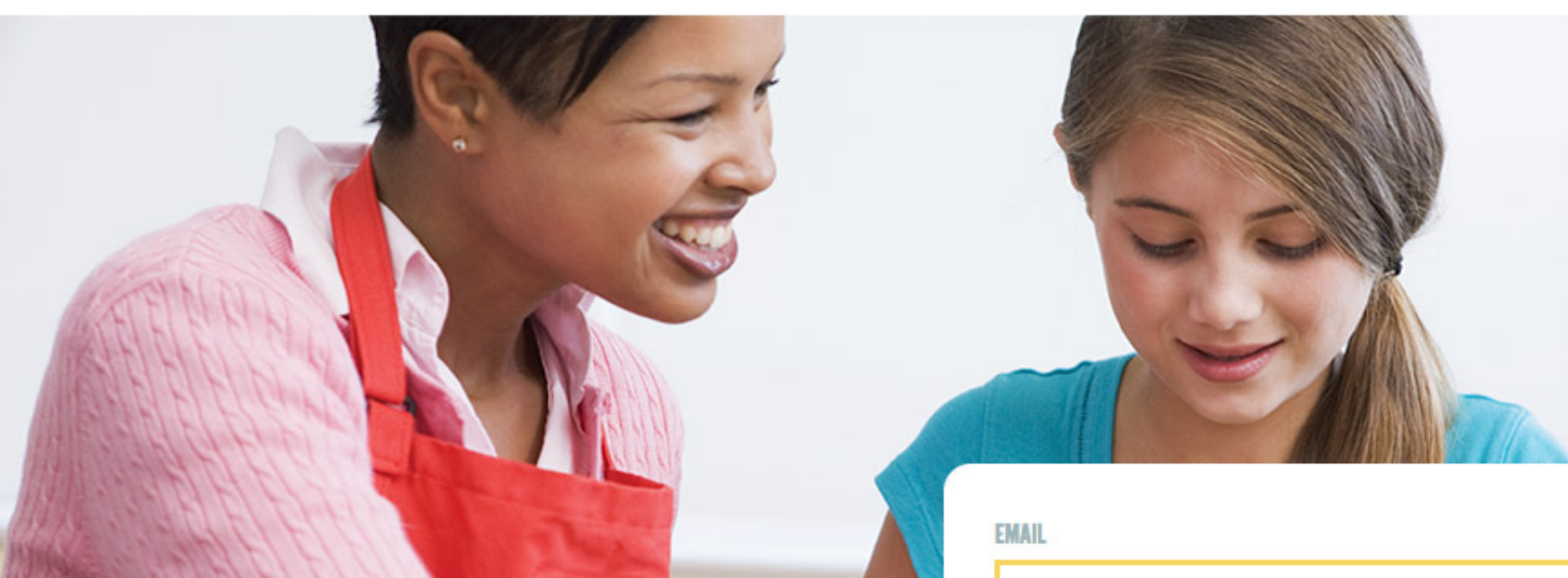


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Ideas That Stick
Use your Post-it[®] notes for a variety of activities. This idea is great for any age and is a great way to use your Post-it notes.

1 Create a poster or designate a space on your board with the title "Big News." Place a stack of Post-it notes nearby. When students have personal events to share, they write them on notes and place them on the board. Make time to share the notes with the class each day.

2 At the end of a lesson or at the end of the day, give each child a Post-it note to use as an exit ticket. Instead of writing on a note, students write a question or an assessment of how successful they feel about the lesson. Use the feedback to adjust your lesson planning.

3 Place a paper line on a wall. Put a Post-it Pop-Up Shaped Note Dispenser nearby. When a student has a question, they place a note on the line. Challenge other students to find the answer, write them on Post-it notes, and add them to the line.

4 Have a student volunteer use the paper line to inspire student writing. Encourage students to brainstorm personal story ideas and post them on the line. When students read writing inspiration, they each take a note from the line and start writing. Creativity will grow!

5 Use colored Post-it notes to create a calendar for your classroom management system. During an activity or lesson, distribute gear notes to students who are on-task and following class rules. Place red yellow notes for students who need to change an undesired behavior. If a student's behavior changes, replace the yellow note with a green one. At the end of the activity, recognize students who received green notes.

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Everything in Its Place
Use a Post-it Pop-Up Shaped Note Dispenser to keep classroom games and centers organized. Place the dispenser on each game or center card and tape the card to a game board. Students can find the game or center card, game board, game materials, directions, or a prompt. When a student needs an activity, he or she removes the dispenser and takes it to a workspace. When the child is done, the dispenser is returned to the dispenser and the board returned to the cart.

Plastic, folded sandwich containers are perfectly sized to hold small items, such as handouts and card games. Plus, they are easy to stack and easy to use.

Multi-line and plastic cups make great portable writing, math, and art stations. Put a plastic cup in each section of a multi-line for writing cards. Fill each cup with a different supply such as pencils, pens, markers, construction paper, highlighters, and stickers. For a math activity, fill each cup with manipulatives, linking cubes, dice, counters, pattern blocks, fraction pieces, and small rulers. For an art activity, fill each cup with markers, markers, glue sticks, scissors, colored pencils, and paintbrushes. Students can easily carry the materials to their desks to work.

After setting up a center or classroom workspace, take a photo of it. Choose a copy of the photo in the same area so students know just what it should look like when they leave it. Invite Principals, try this around the school. List and hand out, recycling cans and restrooms will all stay neat and tidy!

Draw attention to classroom posters by attaching them to wall-mounted poster frames, such as the Barnes Poster Frame. Post-it notes are only all the frames keep the poster in place, but when you are ready to display a poster it will be easy to remove and change.

Have a poster option? To make each classroom poster stay on your walls, attach a strip of Heavy-Duty Sticky Back Tape to the wall. Put the other side of the strip on the back of your poster. It's that easy! Displaying one poster for another takes only seconds when you don't have to fumble with tape or staples.

Clear trash bags make perfect storage containers for classroom posters. Sort posters by topic or date then label a sheet of paper with a name for each set such as Math, Writing, or Study Skills. Put each paper and the posters in an extra-large bag, such as a Weber[®] SuperClear Clear Trash Can Liners. Use the bag to hold a poster and store them in a closet or in a parent's car.
