**First Things First—Figure Out the When and Where**  
Many students don't allow enough time to plan out their projects. Often, the result is a rushed job that might not reflect their best work. We want the best for you! Planning, researching, and presenting ahead of time will help your child feel more confident and prepared for school. This includes not only the actual presentation but also the time to set up and tear down the materials. Look for a space where the work won't be disturbed by parties, siblings, or normal family activities.

**Choose a Topic**  
Sometimes the most difficult step is choosing a topic. This step is the most important for the whole project. It's important that your child choose a topic that interests them. Ask your child to think about what they are good at, what they like to do, and what they are interested in. If the topic isn't of interest to your child, they might not be motivated to do it. It could turn into a boring assignment for the teacher.

**Do the Research**  
Take your child to the library or help them do it. Encourage them to search for information on the Internet. For a hands-on activity, have the children cut out pictures from magazines. As your child gathers information, encourage them to take notes on what they find. This includes an introduction, a body, and a conclusion.

**Presenting the Information**  
Ask your child how they plan to present the display. Will the student use a table or poster? Will the information be written in a paragraph or in a bullet list? If your child is doing a science fair project, remind them to be in the class room to be prepared and to answer all questions. It's okay to ask questions and your child will be glad to answer them. Don't forget to take pictures of your child's presentation.
